TVC Grant TRANSFORMS Heroes' Homes and LIVES

Dozens of older, homebound Central Texas military veterans will receive much-needed repairs to their houses, as well as additional nutritious meals, thanks to \$600,000 in grants from the Texas Veterans Commission to Meals on Wheels and More.

A half-million dollars of the money goes to our Home Repair Program to

pay for major repairs to the homes of at least 45 homebound men and women who served our country in the armed forces. Roof replacement, fixing cracked foundations, plumbing and electrical work, and wheelchair ramp construction are just a few of the repairs planned.

The remaining \$100,000 goes to MOWAM's Veteran Services Program which will use the money to provide additional meals to veterans who have been identified as being nutritionally at-risk.

call home. Thanks to these very generous grants from the Texas Veterans Commission, we can do exactly that," said Dan Pruett, President/CEO of Meals on Wheels and More.

Our Home Repair Program also fixed the leak in the bathroom and installed a new floor to replace the old one which had severe water damage.

The help doesn't stop there. Every Tuesday, Ms. Gonzales drops her husband off at Mike's Place, MOWAM's free respite care program. "That gives me a chance to get away and run my errands. They keep him busy from the moment he gets there. They do

bingo and dancing and drawing and all sorts of activities. He really likes it, he loves it," she explains.

When asked what Meals on Wheels and More means to her and her husband, Ms. Gonzales says "It's been a great help. In our old age, now we can live comfortably and not worry so much because our income is limited. You can always count on Meals on Wheels. They came through, they

helped us. We're so grateful, we really are."

"You Can **ALWAYS** Count on Meals on Wheels"

"I'm just so happy I found out about Meals on Wheels and More when I did because we were really getting desperate," Feliz Gonzales says as her husband, Salvador, sits by her side. Mr. Gonzales is 74 years old and has Alzheimer's.

He and his wife have been married 56 years. They had six children together, followed by six grandchildren, and by this time next year, they'll have six great-grandchildren.

Mr. Gonzales was a carpenter by trade. He worked for a company that built portable school buildings all over Texas. He also served his country honorably; spending two years in the National Guard and eight years in the Army Reserve.

But now, Alzheimer's has slowed him down. Ms. Gonzales spends her days being a full-time caregiver to her

husband, who also has kidney disease and diabetes. If all that wasn't challenging enough, about a year ago, an undetected water leak in their East Austin home sent the couple's utility bills soaring.

It was about this time that Ms.
Gonzales found out about Meals on
Wheels and More after a friend's
mother started receiving our services. Soon, our dedicated volunteers
were delivering nutritious food to
Mr. Gonzales. "I don't have to worry
because he's diabetic and his kidney
function is not well, Meals on Wheels

sees to all of that. Diet control, the meals are very well controlled for his kidneys and his diabetes," she says.

Her husband is also enrolled in MOWAM's Veteran Services program which qualifies him for our Second Meals program, a 7-day supply of frozen breakfasts each week. In addition, we offer the Gonzales specialized case management, helping them find the benefits they deserve by virtue of Mr. Gonzales' time in the military.

Then there was the issue of the water leak and the subsequent big bill. MOWAM successfully located resources to help the couple pay off the balance. "That gave me peace of mind. I can sleep at night," says Ms. Gonzales. "I was worrying that we wouldn't have any services. But Meals on Wheels was able to help with that."

Capital Pedicab Delivers Meals on THREE WHEELS

It's one of those September days when the calendar claims autumn is just around the corner, but the thermometer begs to differ. At 11am, when volunteer Ricardo Andrade shows up at Meals on Wheels and More for his delivery route, the heat index tops 100 degrees. The weather doesn't faze him even though he will be pedaling his way to clients' homes.

Andrade works for Capital Pedicab, a 14-year-old company which operates dozens of three-wheeled cycles in downtown Austin. All of the business' drivers are fully licensed by the city's Ground Transportation Department.

In 2007, Capital Pedicab owner/manager Greg Foulkes decided to form a Meals on Wheels delivery team using his cycles and some of his drivers. "It just seemed like a good thing to do and we had wheels to provide," says Foulkes.

Andrade started working at Capital Pedicab two years ago and has been delivering meals for MOWAM almost as long. On the days he volunteers, he rides to our Central Kitchen to pick up the meals. He then carefully places the food in two coolers and sets them on the seat where passengers would normally sit. As he pedals

his way through his East Austin route and the sweltering heat on this particular day, he says his time spent delivering our nutritious lunches to the people we serve helps keep him in good shape. He also says he enjoys working for a company that gives back to the community. "That's what keeps me with Capital Pedicab. To them, it's more than just making money. The company's trying to make a positive impact on Austin," he says.

All of us at MOWAM thank Capital Pedicab and its intrepid drivers for helping to keep the wheels turning no matter what Mother Nature may throw their way.
