"Meals on Wheels Means A LOT TO US!"

Forty years after a rock shattered Manuela Alcantar's life, floodwaters ravaged her world a second time.

Her son, Horacio Ochoa, was 12 years old on that day in 1973 when he offered to mow his grandmother's yard. The mower ran over a stone and sent it hurtling towards Horacio, hitting him in the face. The tragic accident not only cost him the sight in one of his eyes, it also left him with permanent brain damage.

Ms. Alcantar's husband of 27 years, Jose, helps care for his stepson these days. Mr. Alcantar is confined to a wheelchair and lost the use of one of his hands due to a series of strokes over the past 20 years. The family first began receiving free services from Meals on Wheels and More in 2005; hot, nutritious, meals delivered to their home by our wonder-

ful volunteers, as well as pet food and veterinary care for their two dogs provided by our PALS (Pets Assisting the Lives of Seniors) Program. The Alcantars were grateful for the assistance. Then came their Halloween nightmare.

At 5:30 a.m. on October 31, 2013, the Alcantars were awakened by a neighbor calling to tell them their street was flooded. "I put my feet down on the floor and the water was already so high we couldn't find our shoes," Ms. Alcantar recalls. A few inches of water inside the house

quickly became four-and-a-half feet of water. The family was trapped in their own home. Soon, Mr. Alcantar, because he is unable to stand up, was having trouble keeping his head above water. "I told her 'if they (emergency responders) don't get here soon, we're gone'. It was like a movie. You think it can never happen to you. But it does," says Mr. Alcantar a year later. "I told God if it's our time, at least we're together," Ms. Alcantar adds.

Fortunately, the floodwaters began to recede just as rapidly as they gushed in. Eventually, emergency crews were able to rescue the Alcantars and their two little dogs, Spanky and Lily. But the damage was done. The family had lost everything.

Except for a few nights in a motel and a week living with a relative, (continued on back page)

Moms and Sons Deliver COMPASSION

The Tuesday before Thanksgiving, while most of his friends were enjoying a day off from school, 14-year-old Nathan Beasley and his mom, Agnes, delivered our hot, nutritious meals to some of the people we serve.

The Beasleys are just one of several mother-son duos volunteering for Meals and Wheels and More through the Young Men's Service League (YMSL), a national non-profit organization that encourages young men and their mothers to pursue philanthropic involvement in their community. Nathan and his mom are part of the 4 Points chapter at Vandegrift High School.

"Nathan's grandfather in another city had gotten Meals on Wheels delivered," says Agnes. "He was elderly and couldn't drive anymore. His wife was younger, but had Parkinson's Disease. So they really depended on Meals on Wheels and that's what got us interested in volunteering."

Nathan admits he had his doubts initially. "At first I was a little hesitant to help Meals on Wheels because I didn't know what it would be like" Nathan explained, "But after I did it, I saw just how happy the people are when they get their meals!"

Agnes and Nate deliver meals on school holidays and in the summertime. During the school year, the pair volunteers with our HOPE program which provides a monthly bag of groceries for clients who can still do some cooking on their own. The Beasleys also donate their time and talent performing minor repairs to our clients' homes as part of our Handy Wheel program. Agnes says volunteering provides a valuable learning tool and quality bonding time with her son.

"I want my son to have an appreciation that not everyone gets to live like we do. For me personally, it gives me extra time to spend with Nathan and we can give back to the community together," she says.

Radio Stations Raise MONEY FOR VETERANS

Several local radio stations devoted hours of their airtime on Veterans Day to raise money for both our Veterans Services Program and Honor Flight, another non-profit that helps those who served in the military.

The stations that took part in the campaign: KOKE-FM, The Fringe 105.3, The Horn 104.9, and The Word AM 1260, comprise the Austin Radio Network. On-air talent from all four stations spent the morning of November 11 talking about the importance of honoring veterans and urged listeners to donate to the cause. The message obviously resonated with those who tuned in. By the end of the campaign, donations topped the \$12,000 mark and the money was split

evenly between MOWAM and Honor Flight.

the three Alcantars lived in their garage for almost two months while their home was being rebuilt. Our Home Repair Program replaced the roof, installed windows and doors, and widened doorways so Mr. Alcantar could more easily maneuver his wheelchair. Of course, we continued to provide them with our Meals on Wheels and PALS services.

The Alcantars have been living in their restored home for several months now. The house contains very few furnishings since they can't afford to replace many of the

items lost in the flood. That's why the Alcantars were selected to be one of the families featured in this year's Austin American Statesman's Season for Caring holiday giving campaign. Asking for help comes hard to Mr. Alcantar. "I'm the kind of person who worked for a living. But I can't work anymore," he says quietly.

He and his wife appreciate the help provided by our agency. Ms. Alcantar says "there's no telling where we would be today if it wasn't for Meals on Wheels and More. Meals on Wheels means a lot to us. They never left us. They've always been there for us."
